# What is Podcasting?

#### Podcast

 a collection of digital media files which is downloaded from the Internet, often using subscription or syndication feeds, for playback on portable media players and personal computers.

# What's the big deal about podcasts?

- 1 in 5 18-28 year olds own an iPod or MP3 player
- Students overwhelmingly like having the option to download podcasted lectures

#### Pedagogical Podcast Considerations

#### Uses

- Students can access and review lectures from previous classes
- Instructors can incorporate supplemental materials to add depth to class
- Student projects can be produced and submitted as audio assignments

# Benefits to teaching & learning

- Enables new ways to explore course materials
- Puts course materials in their hands when they need it.
- Expands the reach of the classroom
- Students learn new technical skills

### Recommended steps:

- 1. Select appropriate content
- 2. Determine your instructional goal
- 3. Design your content
- 4. Produce your podcast
- Incorporate your podcast into your course
